



A LETTER FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear AFH Owners of Washington State...

Adult family homes are quickly becoming the premier option for long-term care in the state of Washington. Over the last several years, adult family homes represent the only sector of long-term care that is growing. While we have lost many nursing home and assisted living beds across the state, the number of adult family homes continue to grow. I often get asked why I think there are so many new homes opening. I have a few different answers.

First, there is an unmistakable need. The population statistics suggest that the current population in Washington between the ages of 75 and 84 may grow by as much as 76% by 2030. Hospitals and nursing homes report increasing challenges finding placement for someone trying to find community-based care and housing. Even the rate of growth we experiencing, there is still a need to grow workforce the long-term care and resources.

Another reason is the type of care that an adult family home can offer. Our setting offers a staff-to-resident ratio that never dips below one staff to six residents. In most cases, it's probably more like a 1:3 ratio. This level of individualized, compassionate care offered in a residential home provides truly personalized care planning. This intimate engagement with our residents cannot be replicated in a large facility or institution.

Lastly, the work of the Adult Family Home Council has improved opportunities for those working in and operating an adult family home. Through improved reimbursement rates, specialty contracts, workforce development, expanded business opportunities, access to education, regulatory support, and marketing, adult family homes have been able to thrive. The work of the AFH Council is about improving lives through the support of adult family homes. This report outlines many of the issues we have taken on in the last year. We take this time to mark our accomplishments as we set our eyes on what lies ahead.

Thank you to all the adult family homes that have joined us a members of the AFH Council. To those homes who have not yet joined, please review the content of this report and then complete the membership form herein. Our success will come from all of us working together to ensure that adult family homes continue to have the opportunity to grow and serve people all across our state.

Adult Family Home Council Legislative Priorities


Collective Bargaininng Agreement

As the exclusive bargaining representative of adult family home providers, the Adult Family Home Council engages in contract negotiations with the state every two years to fight for issues related to the reimbursement system for Medicaid funded residents. This process is known as collective bargaining. Last summer the Adult Family Home Council negotiated a new collective bargaining contract with the department of social and health services (DSHS) and the office of financial management (OFM) that resulted in an interest arbitration award that increased adult family homes spending by the largest single dollar amount ever awarded to AFHs in Washington State. Adult family home providers with Medicaid funded residents can expect to see the following:

- \$339 million spending increase for AFHs
- Average base daily rate increase of 29%
- 66% increase to Expanded Community Services
- 8% increase to Specialized Behavior Support
- 56% increase to HIV/AIDS contracts
- 115% increase to Community Integration
- 33% increase to Meaningful Day
- Updated county designation. The new contract will now have two county categories instead of three.

AFH Health Care Navigator

A study conducted by the Adult Family Home Council found that 90% of Adult Family Home workers lack access to affordable healthcare coverage. As the demand for long-term care continues to grow, lack of employment-based health care coverage has affected providers ability to hire and retain long-term care workers. During the 2023 legislative session, the Adult Family Home Council advocated for access to affordable health care coverage for both providers and workers. As a result, the legislature awarded the Adult Family Home Council's AFH Training Network \$672,000 to create educational resources and training and to employ a healthcare navigator that would be responsible for assisting AFH owners and their employees apply for free or affordable health care coverage.

AFH Language Access Pilot Program

In 2019 the Adult Family Home Training Network, housed in the Long-Term Care Foundation, was established to assist eligible adult family homes recruit, train, and retain new qualified long-term care workers. A recent study conducted by the Long-Term Care Foundation found that 29% of long-term care workers could have benefited from language access support during their training. With the recent workforce shortages, the Adult Family Home Council along with the Long-Term Care Foundation and AFH providers advocated for a Language Access Pilot Program during the 2023 legislative session. This resulted in an \$800,000 award from the legislature for a pilot project focused on providing translation services for interpreting mandatory courses offered through the Adult Family Home Training Network.

Additional Funding for Adult Family Homes

Adult Family Home Heat Pumps

The Adult Family Homes of Washington State were awarded \$5,000,000 in grants to install heat pumps so residents, providers and workers can stay cool during very hot summer months.

Legislative Bills

Home Care Aide Certification

After multiple attempts at trying to address the home care work force shortages, we were excited to see several legislative bills this session focused on addressing this issue. HB 1694 addresses the home care workforce shortage by defining the date of hire, expanding timelines for long-term care workers seeking certification as a home care aide, and exempting certain home care aides and nursing assistants whose licensing credentials have expired from paying late fees or renewal fees. SB 5278 implements audit recommendations to reduce barriers to home care aide certification by requiring the exam to be conducted in series of examinations, at local testing sites, in the preferred language of the applicant taking the exam, expanding who can administer the exam, and more. Both bills have been signed by the governor and are expected to be implemented July 23, 2023.

Developmental Disability Enhanced Specialty Pilot

\$6,881,000 was provided by the legislature to pilot a specialty rate for adult family homes to serve up to 100 individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities who also have co-occurring health or behavioral health diagnoses.

Rapid Response Teams

The rapid response nursing program was awarded \$34,800,000 through the end of FY 2024. The rapid response program provides staffing teams to assist long-term care facilities manage workforce shortages and support beds that serve individuals discharged from acute care hospitals after their medical needs have been met.

Personal Needs Allowance

Your residents get to keep more money! HB 1128 increases the personal needs allowance from \$75.36 to \$100 for residents being served in medical institutions and residential settings. Additionally, the bill requires the residential personal needs allowance to be adjusted for economic trends and conditions.

AFH Property Tax Exemption

HB 1265 establishes a property tax exemption for adult family homes that serve people with intellectual or developmental disabilities and are owned directly by a nonprofit organization, corporation, or association; or indirectly through lease, sublet, or service agreement with a provider operating an adult family home that specifically provides services for persons with developmental disabilities, without regard to the nonprofit status of the operator of the adult family home.



The Long-Term Care Foundation is a 501(c)(3) organization committed to improving and developing access to high-quality, long-term care services through:

public awareness community connections a well-supported long-term care workforce

The Long-Term Care Foundation is also the organization created by the Adult Family Home Council to develop and manage the **Adult Family Home Training Network** to provide **training, workforce development and other services** to adult family home operators and staff. Funding for the training network comes from a portion of the training benefit negotiated in the collective bargaining agreement between the Adult Family Home Council and the State of Washington. Funding began in 2020 and will be ongoing to support the maintenance and enhancement of the network. We are looking forward to a significant increase in our funding during the next biennium with the implementation of the new collective bargaining agreement so effectively negotiated by John Ficker.

We strengthen workforce development in adult family homes by providing ongoing human resources education, guidance, and support, as well as assistance in recruiting and training additional caregivers. We continue to expand our series of webinars on HR Best Practices. We provide guidance, tools, and templates on a variety of HR topics, from recruitment, hiring, training, and retention to performance management, discipline, and termination. We will soon complete a revised Employee Handbook for adult family homes to use as a template, and we offer slides, recordings, and regularly-updated FAQs of our webinars and presentations in the Resources section of our website at www.longtermcarefoundationwa.org/resources.

Through our training network, we provide **funding** to pay for the **training** required for sponsored individuals working in eligible adult family homes to become certified as **Home Care Aides** (HCAs) or **Certified Nursing Assistants** (CNAs). We also reimburse their adult family homes with a stipend to ensure these employees are paid while they complete the training and certification process. Also, we provide **funding** to pay for the **training** for sponsored individuals working in eligible adult family homes who wish to enhance their skills and further develop their careers by completing an approved **Adult Education**, **AFH Administrator Training**, **CPR/First Aid** (**Initial**), **HCA to CNA Bridge Program**, **HCA Pre-Prometric Test Refresher**, and **Specialty Trainings** (**Dementia**, **Mental Health**, **Nurse Delegation**, **Nurse Delegation with a Special Focus on Diabetes**). Our **Workforce Development Team**: Shereice Brown (Workforce Development Manager), Zenaida Almodovar (Workforce Development Specialist), Tiffany Kalegi (Workforce Development Specialist) and Cassheina Penfield (Recruiting Specialist), are continuing to develop **human resource best practice materials** for adult family homes and provide them with **ongoing HR support**. They also administer our training network and assist adult family homes in **recruiting new caregivers**. We look forward to expanding our scope of work—and our team—in the Fall of 2023. We will begin to provide **care navigation services** for AFH providers wishing to offer health insurance to their employees and access subsidies to pay down the cost of the premiums. Also, we will begin offering **language access support** to individuals in our training network who would benefit from the availability of interpreters to work with them in their preferred language throughout the training and certification process.
